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# Impacts of Governor's Proposed <u>2011-2012</u> Budget Reductions on Peninsula School District's Efforts to Raise Achievement Levels of All Students

#### I. Elimination K-4 Staffing Ratio Support

- a. Loss of approximately 12 teachers.
- b. Higher class sizes in Kindergarten-4<sup>th</sup> grades

#### **II. Elimination Highly Capable Funding**

- a. Loss of funding to provide for reduced class sizes and educational opportunities for highly capable students.
- b. Loss of ability to assess students for future program access.

### III. Suspend Student Achievement Program under Initiative 728

- a. Larger class sizes, especially K-2.
- b. Loss of targeted classroom support for struggling students, especially high school mathematics.
- c. Loss of teacher professional development.

### IV.<u>Loss of salary support for National Board</u> Certified Teachers

- a. National Board Certified Teachers spend thousands of their own money to complete the demanding process to become certified.
- b. Peninsula has 71 teachers currently Nationally Board Certified. This represents over 12% of our certificated staff!

## V. Loss of salary support for teachers earning higher degrees and remaining in classrooms

- a. Teachers continuously learn and return to school to earn higher graduate degrees to improve their ability in the classroom, at their own cost
- b. Teachers learn from each other and constantly improve by remaining in the teaching profession.
- c. State funds are needed to provide teacher salary and professional development increases to recognize and encourage these professional improvements.

(Note: Peninsula School District does not currently receive Levy Equalization Funds)
